Attendance

Nevertheless, a GOOD RECOMMENDATION is to complete each survey and quiz soon after each week's class and before moving to the subsequent week's material. That will keep you on pace in the course.

Journals

There will be weekly online journals worth 2 points apiece. Written responses should be 1-2 substantive paragraphs.

You are expected to complete 10 journals, but there will be 12 available. If you complete extra journals, they will count as EXTRA CREDIT. No other extra credit will be offered.

Quizzes

Quizzes are intended to examine your knowledge of our recent readings. They will mostly consist of true-or-false and multiple-choice questions and are worth 5 points apiece. No timers. You can save your answers and return to a quiz later, but they only permit ONE SUBMISSION.
